



National law

- New Code of Children and Adolescents (2000)
 - Art. 3 Right to live in a safe environment
 - Art. 4 Right to personal, moral, physical, and psychological integrity
 - Art. 5 Right to freedom
- Criminal Code
 - Art. 152 Human Trafficking
 - Art. 173 Rape of minor under 14 years of age
 - Art. 175 Sexual seduction
 - Art. 179 Facilitation of prostitution
 - Art. 181 Procuring (pimping)

Weaknesses in the legal system



Detection and referral

Denouncement, investigation, and protection measures

Assistance, follow-up, and recuperation of victim

Judicial process

- Lack of awareness and interest
- "Battle between institutions"
- Low budget, resources, understaffed, lack of logistical support such as mobility
- High level of corruption
- Lawyers are not specialized and are rotated frequently
- Inadequate coordination and follow-up
- Victims and their aggressors are provided with legal advice from the same institution

National & regional programs

- National Program against Sexual and Domestic Violence
 - Emergency Women's Centers
- National Integral Program for Family Well-Being
- National Program "Yachay"
- Regional Network against Human Trafficking Cusco
- Regional Direction of Exterior Trade and Touristm
- Ombudsman Office


Weaknesses in national & regional programs

- Programs are not coordinated
- Lack of system of protection for children
- Not considered a priority for political agenda
- Limited budget
- Dependency on interns, students, and volunteers

Shelter Home"Virgen Natividad"

- Located in city of Cusco, Department of Cusco
- National Integral Program for Family Well-Being
- Center of Residential Attention (CAR)
- National System for At-Risk Populations
- Attends adolescents ages 12-17 who have received protection measures by judicial order as a result of being found in sexual exploitation.
- Mission: To orient and develop prevention strategies with children and adolescents victims of commercial sexual exploitation by providing them with integral care and support for reinsertion in the family, social, and work environment.





Key dimensions: Phase 3

- Experiences before arriving to the shelter
 - Conditions of sexual exploitation
- Arrival to the shelter
- Services and activities provided regularly
- Relationships between adolescents, workers, volunteers
- Personal changes since being in the shelter
- What would you change about the shelter?
- What are your plans for the future?

Observations

- Hostile relations
- Mechanisms of punishment and threat
 - Treatment towards adolescents are "criminals" or "suspicious"
 - Re-victimization of adolescents
 - Adolescents are thought of as "lost cases"
- Insufficient curriculum development
 - Activities are not oriented towards integral development
 - Adolescents only attend school twice a week
- Dependence upon un-trained foreign volunteers
- Little contact between the psychologist and adolescents
 - No psychological therapy

Observations

- Thought of as a transitory place with an average of 3 month, however, most adolescents stay more time up to years
- Untrained staff and high rotation
- No nurse or social worker
- Insufficient infrastructure
 - No privacy (16 girls share one room)
 - Open to cold mountain air
 - Deficient facilities
- High rate of depression, sadness, and anxiety
- Isolated from the real world
 - Adolescents are not provided with skills to insert themselves into the real world upon leaving the shelter.

Conclusions

- Severe deficiencies in providing recuperation and social reinsertion
- Other than the Shelter Home "Virgen Natividad," there is no other place that offers the specific assistance needed
- Future tasks
 - Establishment of a system of protection for children and adolescents
 - Insertion of the problem in the public agenda
 - Expansion of specialized services
 - Coordination into state actors
 - Implement a system of monitoring
 - Improvement of the Shelter Home "Virgen Natividad"
